## GRANT PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT

## CRIME VICTIM ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

### INTRODUCTION

The Arizona Criminal Justice Commission pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-2407, has authorized the distribution of Crime Victims Assistance funds through a competitive grant process. The Commission will make multiple awards for state fiscal year 2012 (July 1, 2011 – June 30, 2012). The distribution amount will be \$1,020,000 in state dollars. The grant funds must be **used to provide victim assistance services** directly to crime victims in Arizona in compliance with Arizona Administrative Code (A.A.C.) R10-4-201 through R10-4-204 and Commission guidelines. In fiscal year 2011, 44 awards were made; the majority of the awards were for salary and fringe benefits for those providing direct services to crime victims. The average award was \$23,000. The grant solicitation period for the ACJC Victim Assistance Grant Program will open on **Monday, January 31, 2011**. See the APPLICATION PROCESS section of this announcement for application completion and submission information.

Proposals will be considered from public agencies, tribal agencies and private non-profit organizations. For non-profit organizations, two additional items must be submitted with the application: 1) A copy of the IRS letter designating the organization as a 501(C)(3) non-profit, or if that is not available a copy of the organizations most recent IRS form 990; 2) A current letter from a prosecutor's office or law enforcement agency endorsing the application.

### ALLOWABLE COSTS

The Crime Victim Assistance program is established to **provide effective victim assistance services** to crime victims in Arizona. In accordance with A.A.C. R10-4-204, services eligible to receive funding are:

- Crisis intervention services for the urgent emotional or physical needs of crime victims, which may include a 24-hour hotline for counseling or referral for victims.
- Emergency services including:
  - a. Temporary shelter for victims who cannot safely remain in their current location;
  - b. Petty cash for immediate transportation, food, shelter, and other necessities; and
  - c. The temporary repair of locks and windows damaged as a result of a crime to prevent immediate, repeat burglary of a home or apartment.
- Support services including:
  - a. Follow-up counseling dealing with the victimization;
  - b. Assistance with other social service and criminal justice agencies;
  - c. Assistance obtaining the return of property kept as evidence;
  - d. Assistance dealing with the victim's landlord or employer; and
  - e. Referrals to other sources of assistance as needed.
- Court-related services including:
  - a. Direct services or petty cash that help victims participate in criminal justice

- proceedings, including transportation to court, childcare, court escort, meals, and parking expenses; and
- b. Advocate services including escort victims to criminal justice-related interviews, court proceedings, and assistance in accessing temporary protection services.
- Notification services including:
    - a. Notifying victims of significant developments in the investigation or adjudication of their case;
    - b. Notification that a court proceeding for which the victim has been subpoenaed has been canceled or rescheduled; and
    - c. Notification of the final disposition of the case.
  - Training for salaried or volunteer staff of criminal justice, social services, mental health, or related agencies that provide direct services to crime victims.
  - Cost of printing and distribution of brochures or similar announcements describing the direct services available, how to obtain program assistance, and volunteer opportunities.
- Applicants may apply for funding to provide these services throughout the state of Arizona.

## **RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF FUNDS**

### Ineligible Services/Expenses:

- Crime prevention efforts other than those aimed at providing specific emergency help after victimization;
- General public relations programs;
- Advocacy for particular legislative or administrative reforms;
- General criminal justice agency improvements;
- Programs in which crime victims are not the primary beneficiary;
- Management training and training aimed for persons who do not provide direct services to victims;
- Victim Compensation provided under A.A.C. R10-4-101 through R10-4-108; and
- Homeless shelters.

## **REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**

Funded programs are required to submit quarterly financial and an Annual Performance Report to the Commission and cooperate fully in any evaluation efforts required. One (1) copy of the most recently completed financial audit must be submitted with the application. An approved program is required to allow the Commission or its duly authorized representative's access to, and the right to examine, any books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence of activities conducted pursuant to awards.

## **ALLOCATION PROCESS**

Applications will be reviewed by an evaluation team of at least three qualified individuals. Each grant application will be evaluated according to the Crime Victim Assistance Program Rules and the priorities established by the Commission. Commission staff will prepare a proposed allocation plan. ACJC staff will present the proposed allocation plan to the Crime Victims Committee of the Commission for review. The Committee will make a recommendation regarding the allocation plan to the Criminal Justice Commission for review and final action. The proposed allocation plan will be

made available to all applicants in the meeting agendas. Funds will be disbursed to agencies in accordance with the Commission's final approved allocation plan.

The proposed allocation of funds will be based on the amount requested and the following criteria:

1. Eligibility of services the applicant proposes to provide. **(pass/fail)**
2. Submission of application on time. **(pass/fail)**
3. Completeness and accuracy of application. All requested information and attachments are provided.
4. Program assistance to victims in filing Victim Compensation claims.
5. Effective and efficient use of volunteers in the delivery of victim services.
6. Problem statement identifies the need for services in the community and is supported by statistical data that directly related to the identified problem.
7. The program adequately addresses the problem in the community.
8. Coordination efforts with other public and private victim service providers.
9. Program's ability to meet goals and objectives established by the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission. Measurable outcomes are reasonable and achievable.
10. Mechanisms to evaluate the program are identified and are appropriate.
11. Budget costs are reasonable and allowable. Matching funds are clearly identified and available to the program.
12. Appropriate internal controls are in place to adequately administer the award.
13. Programs previously funded have met the requirements of the grant including timely reporting with no reportable deficiencies during site visits.

Applications will be evaluated to determine whether they meet any of the funding priorities listed below. Those applicants that meet a funding priority will be given one additional point for each funding priority met, for an additional eight points possible. The funding priorities are:

1. \$20,000 provided directly to the Arizona Victim Assistance Academy.
2. Programs that provide unduplicated services within a 35-mile radius.
3. Programs that provide multiple services to a diverse range of crime victims.
4. Programs that demonstrate the highest ratio of **Advocates to Victims Served**.
5. Programs that demonstrate the highest ratio of **Victims to Services Provided**.
6. Programs operating in counties with the highest crime per capita rate based on the latest Uniform Crime Report. Crime data is based on all Index Crimes reported and Part II Victim Crimes only.
7. Programs that demonstrate strong support of established goals and objectives and clearly identify how the success of the program will be measured.
8. Programs that demonstrate a strong collaborative effort with law enforcement, prosecution, service providers, community organizations, and other social service agencies.
9. Programs that demonstrate a strong component of assisting crime victims in filing victim compensation claims.

Applications will be scored using the scoring criteria shown below. **APPLICANTS MUST SCORE AT LEAST 700 POINTS TO BE CONSIDERED FOR FUNDING. HOWEVER, A MINIMUM SCORE OF 700 POINTS DOES NOT GUARANTEE AN AWARD DUE TO THE VERY LIMITED FUNDING AVAILABLE.**

## **APPEAL PROCESS**

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-2704, protests of an award or proposed award may be made to the Crime Victims Committee and then to the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission. An appeal of a decision by the Commission for an award for the Crime Victim Assistance Program may be made to the Director of the Department of Administration and shall be resolved in accordance with the Rules of Procedure pursuant to A.R.S. § 41-2611.

## APPLICATION PROCESS

While the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission would like to support each worthy program, only a limited amount of funding is available. In addition to new projects, the Commission will consider funding existing projects that will require further monies to reach a successful completion.

The grant application for FY2012 must be completed and submitted using the ACJC Grant Management System (GMS). Detailed instructions on how to access the GMS, as well as detailed application instructions and samples, will be available at [www.azcjc.gov](http://www.azcjc.gov) in the VICTIM SERVICES/Victim Assistance Program section of the web site. A computer based video training series on the GMS for Victim Assistance applicants is also available on the ACJC website under VICTIM SERVICES/Computer Based Training.

***Paper or emailed applications will not be accepted. All applications and attachments must be submitted through the ACJC Grant Management System.***

***The application must be successfully submitted to the GMS no later than 3:00 p.m. on Friday, March 11<sup>th</sup>, 2011. Late applications will not be accepted by the GMS or be considered by ACJC.***

Funding recommendations will be presented for the Commission's approval at the meeting on Thursday, May 19<sup>th</sup>, 2011. If approved, a list of funded programs will be posted on the ACJC website no later than Friday, May 27<sup>th</sup>, 2011.
